FACT: The effectiveness of the HPV vaccine does not decrease over time.



Ongoing studies have found that those who received the vaccine continue to have antibodies to the virus, providing long-term protection against infections and pre-cancers. There is no indication that they will decrease over time, but studies continue (1).

TALKING POINT: Current data suggest the vaccine protection is ongoing, with no sign of waning. The mechanism of immune memory has been demonstrated in women who have been vaccinated, indicating the vaccine will provide long-term immunity. If it's discovered that the immunity does wane, a booster may be recommended, similar to many other vaccines.




New HPV Vaccination Education Website

HPV Vaccination Clinical Recognition Program





The Association of American Cancer Institutes (AACI), the American Cancer Society, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have established a partnership to recognize clinicians who positively impact HPV vaccination rates among their patients. The program is designed to reward pediatricians and pediatric practices, family practices, and other clinicians who adopt effective HPV vaccine recommendation practices that incorporate key messages and recommendations from the *HPV Vaccine is Cancer Prevention* Campaign.

The collaborators are in the final stage of developing selection criteria and a nomination form. A panel of CDC reviewers will select one awardee in each of the 10 U.S. Department of Health and Human Services regions.



Public announcement of awardees is scheduled for September – December, 2017, including sessions or announcements at the annual meetings of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Academy of Family Practitioners, and AACI.
